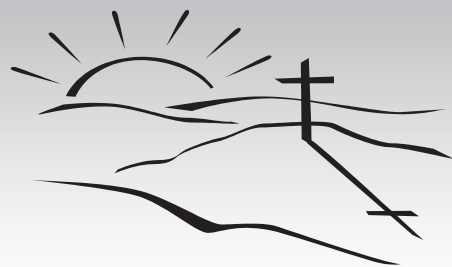


A Loving Remembrance of Our Deceased

Sr. Marie Michael’s youngest brother, Joseph A. Aull, went home to God suddenly on September 24 of this year. Born January 7, 1938, in Knottsville, Kentucky to Michael "Harry" and Mary Pauline Aull, Joe was the 14th in a family of 15 children. When he died, he was the retired Executive Vice-President of Triad Mining Inc. Over the years, Joe’s kindness and great generosity touched many lives, including our own Passionist community, particularly at the time of our relocation. For our Sister Marie Michael, it was Joe’s loving kindness that always stood out to her from childhood on. She particularly remembers her little brother’s loving endurance of “Millie’s” (Sr. Marie Michael) poor culinary arts!

He was indeed a very beloved husband to his wife of 57 years, Lena Hartz Aull. Joe was preceded in death by a son, Joey Aull, and seven brothers and sisters, Jack Aull, Jim Aull, Sister Margaret Joseph Aull, O.S.U., Elizabeth Miller, Beverly Clark, Thomas Charles Aull, and Hazel Ruth Aull. His sister, Mary Thomasine “Tommie” Higdon, died 11 days later. Joe is survived by his wife, Lena; a son, Tim (Lisa) Aull; four daughters, Lisa (Jerry) Huffman, Jackie (Mike) Mize, Terri (John) Wick, and Vickie (Kevin) Insko; a daughter-in-law, Audrey Aull; nine grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren; two brothers, Bill Aull and Bob Aull; and five sisters, Sister Naomi Aull, O.S.U., of the Mt. St. Joseph Ursulines, Sister Marie Michael Aull, C.P., Joy Dunn, and Anna Carolyn "Cricket" Lyddane.

Tommie loved dancing, cooking, talking with her friends at Fern Terra, and most of all spending time with her large and loving family. She tried never to miss a family visit with Sr. Marie Michael here at the monastery, and would usually be right up front with her cheerful and engaging conversation. Sr. Marie Michael cherishes memories of Tommie being a “Miss Clean-Up” at their home as they were growing up.

She was preceded in death by a great grand-child Brandon Higdon and eight brothers and sisters, (named above in Joe’s article). Lo, I Have Come to Do Your Will, O God.



*We adore You, O Jesus our Redeemer!
We love to gaze at Your Face and contemplate Your mysteries!*

In the above depiction of the Nativity, we notice that Mary and Joseph and the Magi are all gazing at the Face of the Infant Messiah. The insightful artist has placed the crucifixion scene off to the side, as a brilliant reminder that “the redemptive Passion was the very reason for His Incarnation” (cf Catholic Catechism quote in the side bar).

United with the Heart of Mary, the Mother of God, we spend our lives keeping our gaze on Christ in a living liturgy of adoration and intercession. Passionist Nuns are dedicated to a continual prayerful pondering of the total mystery of Christ—His Life, Passion and Death. We do this as we carry out the ordinary activities of our daily monastic routine, in the light and sometimes in the “darkness” of the Father’s plan to redeem the world. The Passion Sign we wear over our hearts is meant to reveal what is engraved within our hearts—the loving memory of Christ’s Passion and His entire mystery.

With the tenderness of Christ, we gaze also at the Mystical Body of Christ journeying through history, and we try to bear in our hearts the sufferings and anxieties of all who seek the help of our intercession before the loving Face of God. The Church teaches that our hidden way of life thus becomes “a mysterious source of apostolic fruitfulness and blessing for the Christian community and for the whole world” (cf Verbi Sponsa, Vatican document on Enclosure, 1999).

We also invite you to keep your gaze on Jesus, the Redeemer of the world, in whom the riddle of human suffering reveals its redemptive meaning.

This year, beginning on November 30, the first Sunday of Advent, Pope Francis has called the whole Church to observe a "Year of Consecrated Life." What a wonderful opportunity for us all to reflect upon the beauty, power, and gift of consecrated life! What is it? Why does it exist? How is it related to the whole Church? And what distinguishes our Passionist contemplative life from the many other forms of consecrated life? In this newsletter, we begin what we pray will be a grace-filled year of pondering these questions.

As we begin our meditations on consecrated life specifically, let us look first at who we are as human persons. When God created the human race – when He created each of us individually – He created us to be His spouse. What dignity each human being



has! God loves us so much that He created each man and woman on the face of the earth to be His bride! That is why Jesus calls heaven a "wedding banquet" – for all eternity, we will be celebrating our marriage with God Himself. The Church calls this love of God "the universal call to holiness." No matter what our particular state of life is, we are each called to become so holy, so united with God that we become His spouse.

Most people follow this universal call to holiness through the vocation of matrimony, which is itself a beautiful image of the love between God and the Church. But throughout the centuries, God has asked some men and women to be consecrated to Him alone and, thus, to live their eternal vocation already here on earth. Through the profession of their "marriage vows," the "evangelical counsels" of poverty, chastity, and obedience, these consecrated souls conform their lives as closely as possible to the earthly life of Jesus, their divine Bridegroom. Joyfully returning love for Love, they give themselves entirely to Him and to His work on earth. As they do so, their lives become powerful signs to the whole world, proclaiming what each person is created

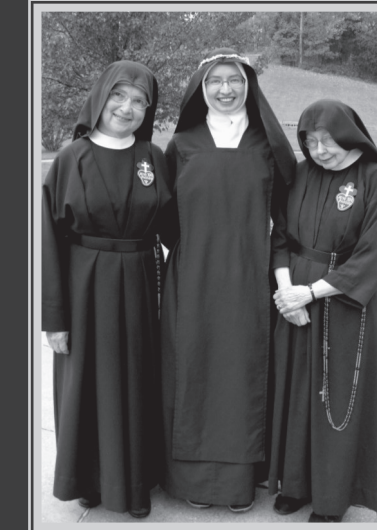
Celebrating a Life Totally Given to Christ
