We were thrilled when Pope Francis announced the Year of St. Joseph at the close of the unforgettable year 2020. It came at the dawn of the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the founding of the Passionist Nuns (May 3, 2021), as well as the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of our monastery dedicated to his patronage (October 7, 2021), and the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of our relocation from Owensboro to Whitesville (December 2020). And now St. Joseph is overseeing our Cherish the Flame project for the expansion and improvement of our living quarters.

The history of our monastery is a testimony to God's loving providence, especially as mediated through the intercession of St. Joseph. From our first nuns in 18<sup>th</sup>-century Italy, all the way to the nuns who have carried on Passionist life here in the diocese of Owensboro, our story tells of women who have been open to the journey of faith, and of the wonders that God's Providence can accomplish through hearts that, like St. Joseph, keep on saying "yes" to His plan.

## Cherishing Passionist Life - 250 Years

"Do you not see, Crucified, how all of My promises are exactly fulfilled?" Joy and tender gratitude welled up in the heart of Mother Mary Crucified of Jesus as she heard these words, spoken by Jesus in the depth of her soul. It was May 3, 1771, a day that marked a new beginning for her and for ten other women, as they entered the Monastery of the Presentation at Corneto (present day Tarquinia) Italy and became the first women to live Passionist contemplative life according to the Rule written by St. Paul of the Cross. In 1738 she had first met the Passionist founder, and shortly thereafter Jesus Himself had revealed to her in a vision that she was to cooperate in the founding of a convent of nuns who would share in the charism of the Passionists.

Little did Mother Mary Candida (her name as a Benedictine nun before she became a Passionist) dream that thirty-three years of waiting, trials, setbacks, and obstacles lay between her and the fulfillment of her heart's desire: lack of funding for buildings due to crop failure, disputes on the part of ecclesiastical authorities regarding particularities of Paul's Rule for the Nuns, well-intentioned interference from Mother Candida's own brothers, and an over-zealous Italian Princess, to name a few. How many anguished conversations she must have had with the Good Lord during those years! In the wake of a particular disappointment, Paul of the Cross would reassure her, "Don't worry, for in due time, if this is

the will of God, He will show the way to accomplish everything He wants." Truly, in due time, the promises of her Lord and Bridegroom were exactly fulfilled. The Congregation of Passionist Nuns was established, and from that first monastery it spread across the globe. The second monastery to be founded was in Maumers, France, a monastery named for...guess who? St. Joseph! In the 149 years since the founding of monastery #2, only one other monastery of Passionist nuns named for St. Joseph has been founded. That is OUR monastery! God's unfailing Providence has been manifested in a particular way for our monastery through the intercession of St. Joseph.

### Take up Your Cloaks!

If you ever see an old holy card or image of a Passionist saint, such as St. Paul of the Cross, or St. Gabriel Possenti, you will notice the distinctive black mantle worn over the Passionist habit. Now, if you come and join us for a solemn liturgical celebration in our chapel, you will see the Passionist mantle in real life! It is a traditional part of the Passionist habit both for the priests and the nuns, but it has fallen out of use in recent decades.


We made the decision this year to reinstitute the use of the mantle in honor of the 250<sup>th</sup> Jubilee of the Founding of the Passionist Nuns. We were humbly honored on May 3 to don once again the mantles that our first sisters wore, praying for a "double portion" of the Passionist spirit which they lived so faithfully. We were joined that evening by Bishop Medley and priests and religious of our diocese for Solemn Vespers and a socially-distanced social.

# Cherishing the History of Paint Joseph Monastery 75 Years in the Diocese of Owensboro

A treasured part of the heritage of our monastery of St. Joseph here in Kentucky is the story of Mother Mary Agnes Roche, beloved Mother-Foundress, and how she, in the company of four other sisters from St. Gabriel's Monastery in Scranton, PA set about the daunting task of establishing a new Passionist Monastery here in the diocese of Owensboro. The year was 1944, and it had become clear to Mother and the Scranton community that God was calling them to make the new foundation, but *how in the world* were they to go about it? How to even begin?

For Mother Mary Agnes, the first step was "a long talk with St. Joseph", of which we have an account in her own words: "I said to him, 'What am I to do? They want me to make a new foundation, and I don't know where to go or what to do. But, dear St. Joseph, if you take over, I'll follow the counsel of those who have the right to advise me."

St. Joseph truly did "take over"! Within two years, on October 7, 1946, a new monastery of Passionist Nuns was opened on Benita Avenue in Owensboro Kentucky, and there was no question as to whose patronage the monastery should be dedicated. In the words of Mother Mary Agnes: "It was with great confidence in St. Joseph that we came, as we had so specially placed our difficulties before him...St. Joseph manifested his care by donations sent in his honor or in his name. This happened so frequently that we decided on dedicating the new monastery to his patronage."



The difficulties faced by the Sisters were not few as they strove to carry on their Passionist life while adapting to their new situation, but they received tremendous support from the local Ordinary, Bishop Francis Cotton, the Passionist priests in Louisville, and so many good priests, sisters, and laypeople of the diocese and the surrounding region.


The new "monastery" consisted of a large manor house, a smaller cottage, and a garage, situated on a four-acre space of property. Eager to firmly establish the prayer life of the monastery from the very beginning, Mother Mary Agnes saw to it that alterations were made to the living spaces so that they would be, as a true cloister, suitable for safeguarding the prayer and solitude of the nuns. Most importantly, a space in the larger building was transformed into a chapel where the Blessed Sacrament would be reserved.



To guard holy recollection it was the custom in contemplative monasteries around the world to lower one's veil when receiving workers into the cloister. The nuns discontinued this in the 1950's to the great relief of the workmen!

The nuns began hosting weekend retreats for women in March 1947. To accommodate retreatants, as well as the growing community, they converted the attic into a dormitory for the nuns, leaving the second story for retreatants. The dining room went to the retreatants on the weekends, while the nuns ate in the basement.

To support themselves, in addition to the revenue brought in by the retreat ministry, the nuns baked altar breads, sewed altar linens, and made vestments to supply parishes and priests in the diocese and beyond. Later on, they would also be engaged in some printing work.

It was clear from the beginning that a new wing was needed to provide more adequate space, and also a real chapel, but first on the list was an enclosure wall for the property, a project which began in early 1948. In the course of construction, the contractor

found the expense to be greater than anticipated, and the nuns found themselves short \$2,000. Mother Mary Agnes turned confidently to St. Joseph, and sure enough, in a week's time, on a Wednesday, a check for \$2,000 arrived from a benefactor unknown to the community. The enclosure wall was completed on March 18, the vigil of the feast of St. Joseph.

Mother Mary Agnes continued to quietly raise funds and all the sisters prayed to St. Joseph, holding onto hopes for the next construction project. It was another five years before a two-story wing was completed, and not until 1961 that the rest of the monastery and the chapel were completed. In due time, St. Joseph had come through once again.

The blessing of the new monastery and chapel took place on the First Friday of March-the month dedicated to St. Joseph. Fourteen years after the move to Benita Avenue, the Passionist Nuns had a real monastic home, under one roof with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament.

## Cherishing Twenty Five Years in Whitesville

In the year 1991, the nuns living in the Owensboro monastery heard the call from God to move to a new location. The project was daring to say the least; how ever would these women go about the construction of a whole new monastery? It was confidence in Divine Providence and long experience of the guidance and care of St. Joseph, the "man of the house", that gave the nuns the boldness to step out in faith. "St. Joseph's Helpers" from far and near came together and helped us in so many ways to achieve the impossible.

The big move to the newly completed Whitesville monastery took place in December 1995, and the flame of Passionist life found a new beginning and increased vigor in this sanctuary of prayer, silence, and beauty. The silence and solitude of the location were ideal for fostering contemplative communion with God for nuns and guests alike. The new chapel facilitated participation of guests in the daily Mass and liturgies of the nuns in a way that had not been possible before.

Standing on the shoulders of the valiant women who have carried the flame of Passionist life through the centuries, who lit that fire in the Owensboro monastery, and fanned it to a blaze here in Whitesville, it is a profound honor and joy for us, the nuns of today, to carry on their








## Cherishing Our Deceased Loved Ones

### DONALD TIMOTHY WYNN



Donald Timothy (Tim) Wynn, the father of Sr. Cecilia Maria, passed away at age 72 on December 13, 2020, after a long battle with prostate cancer. Born on Oct. 12, 1948 in Akron, OH, he graduated from the United States Military Academy at West Point in 1971 and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Army Corps of Engineers. His 30 years of military service included assignments in Korea, Thailand, Honduras, Hawaii, and Saudi Arabia, as well as the continental United States. Tim was assigned to six different Corps of Engineer Districts, culminating in his assignment as Commander of the Transatlantic Programs Center. Among other awards, he received the Wheeler Medal, the Legion of Merit, the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, and four Army Meritorious Service Medals.

Upon retiring from the military in 2001, having attained the rank of Colonel, Tim assumed the job of Director of Facilities at Western Washington University in Bellingham, WA, where he oversaw several major construction projects. He permanently retired in the summer of 2011. Tim's wide-ranging interests included astronomy, woodworking, science

fiction books, classical music, hiking, and travelling. He was a member of Christ the Servant Lutheran Church in Bellingham.

The Passionist Nuns have always counted the parents of our Sisters as our biggest benefactors, for they give the price-less gift of a daughter to be one of the brides of Christ Crucified. Over the eleven years that we were blessed to count Tim as a part of our family, he truly became a beloved friend and constant support for our life of prayer at the foot of the Cross. Our monastery is graced with several pieces of woodworking from his workshop, and one of his few regrets at the close of his life was that he never got to see the Cherish the Flame building project underway! Tim's love, wisdom, and wit is missed, but we are certain he remains one of our benefactors, interceding for us now with the Lord!

### Mary Marcella Schepers

On November 1, 2020, a beloved member of our Oblate community, Mary Marcella Howard Schepers, was called home to God. Marcella and her husband, Elmer (RIP 2014) were charter members of our Passionist Oblates, joining the association at its beginnings in 1997.

Marcella and Elmer lent their helping hands for many monastery projects over the years. She was the first manager of our Passionist Inspiration Gift Shop. She was a lifelong lover of learning, and diligently studied the Faith, our Passionist charism, and the works of our Founder, St. Paul of the Cross. We could always count on deep insights and thought-provoking questions from Elmer and Marcella at the monthly Oblate meetings. Even when she was no longer able to come to the meetings, she treasured the Passionist charism and proudly displayed her Passion sign.

The Lord permitted her a special share in His Cross in the last months of her life as she suffered from the isolation of the COVID lockdown. We know that her love for Christ Crucified, which we had watched her nurture so faithfully throughout her life, sustained her in these days until her final Passover with Him into Resurrection joy. She went home to the embrace of the Lord on the Solemnity of All Saints. We extend our sympathy to Marcella's brothers, children, and all her family.



#### LAWRENCE ANTHONY SEITZ



Lawrence A. Seitz, brother of Sr. Mary Therese, passed away on April 13, 2021. He was born in Paducah on December 1, 1942 to the late John M. Seitz and Rosalee Englert Seitz. Lawrence was a retired home builder. He was a member of St. John's the Evangelist Catholic Church. Lawrence served in the United States Army.

Lawrence is remembered as a humble, loving brother with a quiet yet strong faith. His experience of suffering at different times in his life deepened his faith and gave him an awareness of eternity. A lasting legacy of his here at our monastery are the outdoor Stations of the Cross. In 2011, Lawrence and his family refurbished the brass stations and built a wooden gabled stand for each to be placed inside of. Ever afterwards, every visit to "Sr. Betty", he would go out and clean the brass, and clear away any spider webs. His loving work turned out to be a preparation for his own Way of the Cross, as shortly after completing our Stations, he was diagnosed with a brain tumor and faced an eleven-hour surgery which was successful, though

he would bear the lasting effects for the rest of his life. He faced this cross as he did all the hardships of his life, with strong faith, cheerfulness, and with love for his family and for God which made him think of others and not of himself.

Our condolences and prayers to his wife of 54 years, Judy Scott Seitz; daughters Lori Bondurant and Kim Valerius, and to all the family.


